The Boulder Valley School District currently has grants from the Colorado Department of Education, that provide out-of-school time programs (after school, before school, on summer break) at Alicia Sanchez International Elementary School in Lafayette, Colorado, and Emerald Elementary School in Broomfield, Colorado. A third center is hosted at Justice High School (an alternative school for at-risk students) in Lafayette. These are funded by multi-year federally-sourced Title IV 21st Century Learning Center grants. The district has recently applied for funding to add Centers at Angevine Middle School and Centaurus High School in Lafayette, and Columbine, Crest View, University Hill, and Whittier elementary schools in Boulder

The Learning Centers located at these schools may provide academic support, such as tutoring, academic enrichment (e.g.STEM, arts, physical activities/sports, etc.), and parent education and involvement programming (ESL, parenting, etc.). Age-appropriate services are designed to meet the needs of low-income, immigrant, English-learner, disabled, and/or homeless students, children of color, and other underserved or at-risk pupils, and their parents. The Centers <u>do not</u> provide daily child care or summer school.

Children attending nonpublic schools that are near the schools listed above, or who live in neighborhoods adjacent to these schools, may be eligible to participate in their Learning Center programs, under the 'equitable services' provisions of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act.
